150kg 'not in a class' campaign update

In our last newsletter we shared the work that we have been doing regarding the update to current Government guidance that would require disabled children to have driving licences and insurance for their powered wheelchairs.

Since raising awareness of the impact of this guidance, along with the publication of the results of our survey which saw more than 400 responses from powered wheelchair users and their carers, the Alliance's CEO Nick Goldup and chair Karen Pearce met with the Department for Transport to discuss. At the meeting it transpired that the rules outlined in the guidance were actually already law!

While this is a worse situation than anticipated, with many powered wheelchair users unwittingly breaking the law when using their wheelchair outside of their homes, the Department for Transport are open to working with the Alliance on this. But, unless it is made a priority, it could take years to change the law and guidance. Therefore we have urged the Government to make it a priority to make much-needed changes to the current guidance and law. This includes the removal of the requirement for a driving licence, the eradication of the use of 'invalid carriages', along with simplification of the classification system.

This meeting was followed in May by Karen Pearce and Stephen Duckworth OBE being interviewed by ITV News about our 150kg campaign. These interviews were then shown on eight different ITV News programmes across England in one

evening! Each report also featured comments from wheelchair users local to those areas about how the legislation would impact them.

This took weeks of planning and we want to say a massive thank you to everyone who took part and helped us and ITV to pull this together.

We hope it has raised further awareness around this issue facing users of powered wheelchairs.

Wheelchair Quality Framework

Another milestone moment for the Wheelchair Alliance came by surprise at the end of April when we were contacted by NHS England.

We had previously been working with NHS England to finalise the Quality Framework that relates to wheelchair provision in England, with the aim of creating a centralised document used by Integrated Care Boards (ICBs) across the country to standardise wheelchair provision and demonstrate best practice. With the

changes in Government and NHS England over the last year or so, we felt like the project was 'stuck'.

So, we were delighted when things started to move quickly with the new Quality Framework now being published!

Wheelchairs provide a significant gateway to independence, wellbeing and quality of life for thousands of adults and children. They play a substantial role in facilitating social inclusion and improving life chances through work, education and activities that many people who do not need wheelchairs take for granted.

However, variation in wheelchair service provision can affect the timely access to necessary equipment and services which can then impact clinical outcomes and the quality of life of people who rely on these services.

We are hopeful that this new Quality Framework will support ICBs and NHS wheelchair service providers in delivering high-quality provision that offers improved access, outcomes and experience.

This framework has been co-produced by the Wheelchair Alliance and the NHS England National Wheelchair Advisory Group which represents people with lived experience, clinicians, commissioners, plus key organisations including the British Health Trade Association, Posture and Mobility Group, ResMag, National Wheelchair Managers Forum, Whizz Kidz and New Life.

This is a massive achievement and we want to thank everyone who fed into this and helped make it happen.

Now that it is published, we will continue to work with NHS England to help ensure that this framework is implemented and hope to work in a specific area of the country to test and implement it.

A landmark day for the Alliance with launch of **APPG**

After months of hard work, we finally launched our All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) for Wheelchair Users.

It was a landmark day for us all at the Alliance which was a real collaborative effort between the Alliance, its board and President, MPs and partners.

Our first official APPG meeting was held at Portcullis House in Westminster and was chaired by Daniel Francis MP and our president, Tanni Grey-Thompson, with Whizz Kidz acting as Secretariat.

This inaugural meeting concentrated on the formation of the group, followed by presentations on the Alliance, our reports and the 150kg issue we have been campaigning on. We also heard from wheelchair users about their lived experiences.

This group is a significant step forward for the Wheelchair Alliance and will enable us to further strengthen the voices of wheelchair users and get them heard at the highest levels of Government.

A big thank you goes to everyone who has supported us with this.

Here, the findings of our latest piece of independent research which identified the key recommendations that will facilitate improved wheelchair provision, were presented.

New accessible transport company launches

A start-up transport company is on a mission to help support 15 million accessible trips a year by 2030.

<u>Open Road Access (ORA)</u>, which believes accessibility is the cornerstone of a better tomorrow in which everyone can move freely and independently, is already building towards that goal, starting with accessible car rentals.

Over the last 12 months, the company has worked on developing a Wheelchair Accessible Vehicle (WAV) rental service, serving over 1,000 customers and listening to and learning from the insights of wheelchair users. Now, ORA is establishing collaborations with key partners like the Spinal Injuries Alliance (SIA) and Accessible Holiday Escapes, to help ensure that as many people as possible are aware of ORA services and have an opportunity to get involved.

The ORA service model is designed with innovation, flexibility and inclusivity at its core. A range of cars are available with a variety of adaptations including steering controls, ramps or lifts, and customisable seating configurations, to help ensure comfort and safety for all passengers.

The service is available nationwide with delivery and collection included, meaning users can get an accessible car straight to their driveways, or pickup at a UK airport. Cars can be hired for periods ranging from a single day to several months with insurance and breakdown cover included in every booking, giving customers peace of mind.

It's great to see innovation in this space, giving more choice to the end user and with a 4.8/5 TrustPilot rating, ORA has been thrilled by the response from the community. As a company doing its bit to close the transport accessibility gap, they are excited to hear from, and work with, Wheelchair Alliance members and supporters.

Self-service wheelchair stations help improve accessibility

<u>Wheelshare</u>, which provides self-service wheelchair stations, similar to different bike schemes, is helping to drive innovation through its service which is designed to improve accessibility in hospitals, transport hubs and public spaces.

Established in 2017, its state-of-the-art, modular system helps to ensures that wheelchair users and those with reduced mobility have immediate, hassle-free access to wheelchairs when and where they need them.

The 'share' in Wheelshare reflects the company's vision of a more inclusive, community-driven mobility solution, where wheelchairs are always available, easily returned, and shared efficiently to serve as many people as possible. By streamlining wheelchair availability, it also helps healthcare providers optimise resources while enhancing independence and dignity for users.

"At Wheelshare, we are dedicated to making wheelchair access easier, smarter, and more efficient for people with reduced mobility," said Ido Perry, managing director, Wheelshare UK & Ireland.

"Partnering with the Wheelchair Alliance is an important step in supporting this vision, ensuring that wheelchairs are available when needed and shared responsibly. We look forward to working together to create a more inclusive and accessible future."

While this is an opportunity for those who need assistance to gain more accessibility in certain locations, it is important to remember that it isn't a replacement for a prescribed piece of equipment.

We look forward to working with Allison and seeking her support in Westminster.




A special screening from our patron

The <u>Disability and Development Report 2024</u> from the United Nations reveals that worldwide, only 70 per cent of transit stations, transit platforms, and bus stations are accessible to wheelchair users which makes travelling difficult for people with disabilities.

Hiring a car is a practical solution – but even this process is not straightforward for wheelchair users. To help with this process, Skyscanner gives useful facts, tips and advice for renting a wheelchair-accessible vehicle.
